On 10/22, as I was out visiting stations, I heard a call for an accident on the interstate with multiple semis involved.

When I arrived on scene, I found our crews performing CPR. I silently prayed that medics would have great skill at what they did. Sadly, the victim later died of their injuries.

Pediatric Tragedy

On October 31, I heard a call for a cardiac arrest. It was on the other side of town, so I did not respond. Moments later, the District Captain was dispatched because the patient was an infant. Our crews were only on scene briefly and quickly transported the child to the hospital. I met them there to offer my support as pediatric calls are very tough on our crews.

While I was with them, a family member of the child came to speak with me. Much to my surprise, this was someone from our church. I spent the next several hours with this family offering my prayers and support. Thank you for making it possible for me to be right where God wants me to be.
