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During the Call

A horrible boating accident that claimed the lives of two adults took place on Sunday, September 21. At approximately 7:15pm I was notified via pager of a water rescue at Half Moon Lake. The initial information was that there was still one person in the water, so I headed to the scene. Just before I arrived, I was redirected to Munroe Regional Medical Center where three of the victims had been transported. Two of the victims were children, who thankfully were in good condition. However, there were no family members en route to the hospital at that time. When I arrived, I was able to stay with the children until their mother arrived.
