Why Your Department Needs a Chaplain

As far back as the 4th century, as the story goes¹, chaplains have been committed to caring for others. And while a variety of institutions and agencies have chaplains, there is no better place for a chaplain to serve than in the fire service.

I have found three simple words that effectively communicate the scope of the work of the fire chaplain. These words are before, during and after.

Before: The chaplaincy is all about relationships and before the call is when the chaplain invests in fire rescue personnel. Weddings, training events, community gatherings, and other non-critical times give us the opportunity to get to know crews a little better. It is through the time spent investing in fire rescue personnel before the call that chaplains earn the right to be there when they are in the midst of a difficult situation either professionally or personally.

During: During the call is a critical time for fire rescue personnel and chaplains are on the frontline supporting first responders in the field. During the call, chaplains are there providing physical and emotional refreshment to fire crews. Day or night, we provide a listening ear and a cold bottle of water. By being on scene, chaplains are able to provide a calm, peaceful presence in the midst of crisis. The presence of a chaplain during the call brings God just a little bit closer.

After: After the call is when chaplains provide ongoing care and assistance to fire rescue personnel. Depending on the severity of the call, first responders may need to process what they have experienced. But even less significant incidents create difficulties and stress over time. And because of the time chaplains invest before and during the call, we have the great privilege of being close to fire rescue personnel after the call.

A class on the fire chaplaincy will be held at the Florida State Fire College on Thursday, April 23. This course is open to current chaplains, as well as those considering involvement as a chaplain in the future. This would also be the perfect opportunity for a department exploring the chaplaincy to find out what it is all about.
